<u>Herman Schnitzmeyer Timeline</u> 1879 - 1939

Nov. 1, 1879	Born in Centralia, Illinois (There has been a significant amount of confusion about his date of birth being 1880 but his draft record states it as 1879.)
1900's	Operated commercial photography studio in Nashville, Illinois
1910	Moved to Montana to homestead on Wildhorse Island
1911	Assistant for Riggins Photo Gallery in Dayton
1912	Partnered with Louis Desch in photography business in Dayton
June 29, 1912	Obtained patent on Wildhorse Island homestead at 160 acres
1914	Moved to Polson, concentrated on scenic views
Dec. 1915	Opened photo gallery, Polson Studio, on the National Bank Block in Polson
1916	Operated photo studio in the Stoughton Building on D Street in Polson
1920's	Took photos for the Great Western Land Company for use in real estate brochures and presentations
1922	Sold studio business to his apprentice, Julius Meiers, who renamed it Lake City Studio
1922	Freelanced photo assignments for the Northern Pacific Railroad
1923	Ten week trip for the Northern Pacific in the Yellowstone and Teton Country
Nov. 1926	Sold equipment, scenic views and negatives to Johan W. Rode
1927	Continued with Northern Pacific assignments
May 1929	Photographed the Cascades for Northern Pacific
Summer 1929	Photographed Mission Range & Mission Canyon for Northern Pacific
1930	Moved to Missoula, lived at the Penwell Hotel
1932	Lectured on Photography at the University of Montana in Missoula under a federal WPA grant. Exhibited a 200 photo show at the University Art Gallery
Mid-1930's	Schnitzmeyer's health began to fail and he became paranoid, suspecting that the British were trying to take over America
Sept. 2, 1939	Herman Schnitzmeyer died at the Thorton Hospital in Missoula. Cause of death was listed as intestinal obstruction and bronchial pneumonia
Sept. 7, 1939	Buried by Missoula County at the Missoula City Cemetery
